
IMPORTANT NOTE: It is **critical** that ADAP clients pick up their medications and attend scheduled appointments in order to avoid losing program eligibility, interrupting treatment and going on the waiting list. Individuals who are on the wait list can obtain their medications through pharmaceutical patient assistance programs (PAPs). Individuals can contact their physician or case manager for more information on how to obtain medications through these programs. All individuals who are not currently on ADAP but are eligible for the program should make sure they have completed their waitlist eligibility appointment with ADAP which is a requirement to obtain medications through PAPs.

5K WALK 4 LIFE - 2K10

PEER NAVIGATOR PROGRAM

HIV Care Center Inc. / Center for Prevention and Treatment of Infections

Beginning September 1, 2010 HIV Care Center, Inc. (the non-profit branch of the Center for Prevention and Treatment of Infections at Dr. Barbara Wade's office), was awarded Ryan White funding to begin a Peer Navigator Program for Area 1 (Escambia, Santa Rosa, Okaloosa, and Walton counties) in Florida. Peer navigators are defined as non-licensed professionals whose qualifications rest on their connection with the HIV population. **Peer navigators will provide education, support, and linkage to individuals with HIV/AIDS who have barriers to adhering to their HIV medical care.** The peer navigators will work along

with the MARC (Medical Adherence and Retention in Care) counselor in working with clients to help improve medical adherence through linkage, education, and support.

The program utilizes a total of five peers (four individuals from Escambia/Santa Rosa Counties and one individual from Okaloosa/Walton County). These peers are trained, closely supervised, and are bound by the same confidentiality guidelines as the employees of Dr. Wade's office. They will work as part of the treatment team for eligible individuals who enroll in the MARC program. Eligible individuals include those who are HIV positive and have barriers that make it difficult for them to attend regular medical appointments, take their medications as directed, and maintain their overall health. The peer and MARC counselor will help these individuals with identifying and addressing each barrier and act as a liaison with healthcare and community providers who are involved with the consumer's care.

- AIDS Healthcare Foundation (AHF) has opened a new office at Madison Park, 4300 Bayou Boulevard just off 12th Avenue in Pensacola. Their former location on Cervantes Street is closed. This office will provide all of the same services: prevention, testing, and administrative offices for the Positive Healthcare Disease Management program, Positive Healthcare Mobile Clinic and Closing the Gap prevention program. AHF offers free rapid HIV tests Monday through Friday from 8:30am to 12pm (by appointment) and 1 to 4 p.m. (walk-in). THE NATIONAL HIV/AIDS STRATEGY

"The United States will become a place where new HIV infections are rare and when they do occur, every person, regardless of age, gender, race/ethnicity, sexual orientation, gender identity, or socio-economic circumstance, will have unfettered access to high quality, life-extending care, free from stigma and discrimination."

This is the vision for the National AIDS Strategy, the nation's first comprehensive HIV/AIDS strategy, which was released by the White House on July 13, 2010. The White House Office of National AIDS Policy (ONAP) coordinated the development of this significant and long-awaited strategy. To ensure broad public involvement in its development, ONAP held a series of community discussions throughout the nation, including one in Ft. Lauderdale. These discussions engaged communities in the process of developing a comprehensive plan to refocus our prevention and care efforts.

The strategy has three major goals:

1. Reducing the number of people who become infected with HIV,
2. Increasing access to care and optimizing health outcomes for people living with HIV, and
3. Reducing HIV-related health disparities.

The strategy provides an ongoing process for setting priorities and evaluating success. The effective implementation of this strategy will require knowledge, commitment, and coordination at all levels, from federal, state, and county government to local community-based organizations and persons living with HIV/AIDS. How Does the Affordable Care Act Impact People Living with HIV/AIDS?

Historically, people living with HIV and AIDS have had a difficult time obtaining private health insurance and have been particularly vulnerable to insurance industry abuses. People with HIV/AIDS also face barriers to obtaining care from qualified providers. On March 23, 2010, President Obama signed the Affordable Care Act and set into place an effort that will help ensure Americans have secure, stable, affordable health insurance and the relief they need from skyrocketing health insurance costs. Consistent with the goals of the President's National HIV/AIDS Strategy, the Affordable Care Act makes considerable strides in addressing these concerns and advancing equality for people living with HIV and AIDS. Those strides include improving access to coverage, ensuring quality coverage, and increasing opportunities for health and well-being.

Improving Access to Coverage

As early as September 23, 2010, insurers will no longer be able to deny coverage to children living with HIV or AIDS. Insurers also are prohibited from cancelling or rescinding coverage to adults or children unless they can show evidence of fraud in an application. And insurers no longer can impose lifetime caps on insurance benefits. These changes will begin to improve access to insurance for people living with HIV/AIDS and other disabling conditions and help people with these conditions retain the coverage they have.

- The Affordable Care Act also broadens Medicaid eligibility to generally include individuals with income below 133% of the federal poverty line (\$14,400 for an individual and \$29,300 for a family of 4), including single adults who have not traditionally been eligible for Medicaid benefits before. As a result, a person living with HIV who meets this income threshold no longer has to wait for an AIDS diagnosis in order to become eligible for Medicaid.
- The Affordable Care Act also phases out the Medicare Part D prescription drug benefit “donut hole,” giving Medicare enrollees living with HIV and AIDS the peace of mind that they will be better able to afford their medications. Beneficiaries who reach the donut hole in 2010 will receive a one-time rebate of \$250. In 2011, these beneficiaries will receive a 50% discount on brand-name drugs while they are in the “donut hole,” a considerable savings for people taking costly HIV/AIDS drugs. In addition, ADAP benefits will be considered as contributions toward Medicare Part D’s true Out of Pocket Spending Limit (“donut hole”), a huge relief for low-income individuals living with HIV and AIDS.

Ensuring Quality Coverage

The Affordable Care Act seeks to make sure that people with public or private coverage have access to the information they need to get the best quality care. This includes:

Better information. With the passage of the new law, plans will be required to provide information in a user-friendly manner that clearly explains what is and isn't covered.

Quality, comprehensive care. Preventive care. Beginning September 23, 2010 some private insurance plans will cover recommended preventive services like regular check-ups and certain cancer screenings at no additional cost to eligible people. Comparable provisions will apply to Medicare starting on January 1. This will help people living with HIV and AIDS stay healthy.

Coordinated care. The law calls for new investments in community health teams to manage chronic disease. The new law also recognizes the value of patient-centered medical homes (coordinated, integrated, and comprehensive care) as an effective way to strengthen the quality of care, especially for people with complex chronic conditions, and it is proven to be effective as demonstrated by the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Treatment Extension Act of 2009, the pioneer in the development of this model in the HIV health care system.


Increasing Opportunities for Health and Well-Being

Despite significant advances in HIV treatment and education, there are over 56,000 new HIV infections annually with significant racial and gender disparities. The health of people living with HIV and AIDS is influenced not only by their ability to get coverage but also economic, social, and physical factors.

Prevention and wellness. The new law makes critical investments in prevention, wellness, and public health activities to improve public health surveillance, community based programs, and outreach efforts. The new law requires new insurance plans to offer coverage without cost-sharing for HIV screening tests for at-risk individuals. This will enable more people to get access to life-saving treatment more quickly.

Diversity and cultural competency. The Affordable Care Act expands initiatives to strengthen cultural competency training for all health care providers and ensure all populations are treated equitably. It also bolsters the federal commitment to reducing health disparities.

Health care providers for underserved communities. The Affordable Care Act expands the health care workforce and increases funding for community health centers, an important safety-net for low-income individuals and families. A key recommendation of the National HIV/AIDS Strategy is to increase the number and diversity of available providers of clinical care and related services for people living with HIV. The new law will lead to significant new investments to support critical healthcare workforce expansions to better serve vulnerable populations.
